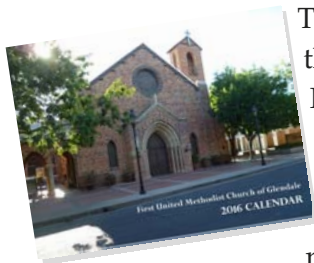

## Salvation is Near!

The season of Advent always begins with an eschatological warning. Escha-ta-logical what, you ask? *Eschatology* is a theology concerning the end of the world and the last days of human life as we know it. This Biblical text is often difficult to understand and usually includes the prediction of various natural disasters and unreal events.

*There will be signs in the sun, moon, and stars...causing people to faint from fear and foreboding of what is coming upon the world* (Luke 21:25a, 26b). Jesus cautions his followers to be watchful, ready and to pray for strength to endure these things. *Don't let that day fall upon you unexpectedly, like a trap...Stay alert at all times*, he warns (Luke 21:34b-35a).

Many have profited greatly on books and literature claiming to have solved the mystery of the end times. Some have even gathered atop a mountain on a particular date expecting to be taken up to heaven. The intent of eschatological literature, however, is not to give the date or time the world will end, but rather to encourage us to be alert, watchful and ready at all

times, because the day will come at an unexpected time. Besides, if we knew the date ahead of time, most of us would probably be less ready than had we not known. Plus there would be mass chaos, hoarding of resources, killing and all manner of havoc, also leaving us less ready. So, why all this scary cosmic end of the world stuff at the beginning of Advent? Perhaps most important, to remind us that salvation is always near, especially in the most upsetting and disturbing of times.

I love Christmas! The lights, singing, gift-giving, being with family and all the special kind-

nesses shown, make Christmas one of the most wonderful times of the year. But Christmas is first and foremost about God coming into a world of great need and immense suffering. Remembering this will keep us watching for every opportunity to share the love that saved us. If we stay alert and pray often, God will show us where the gift of hope is most needed in our little corner of the world, and once again God's salvation will come near.

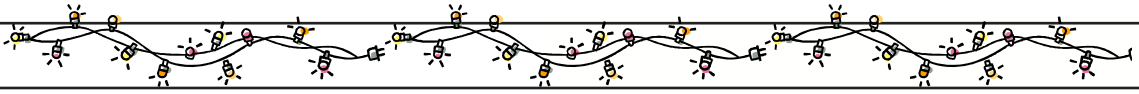

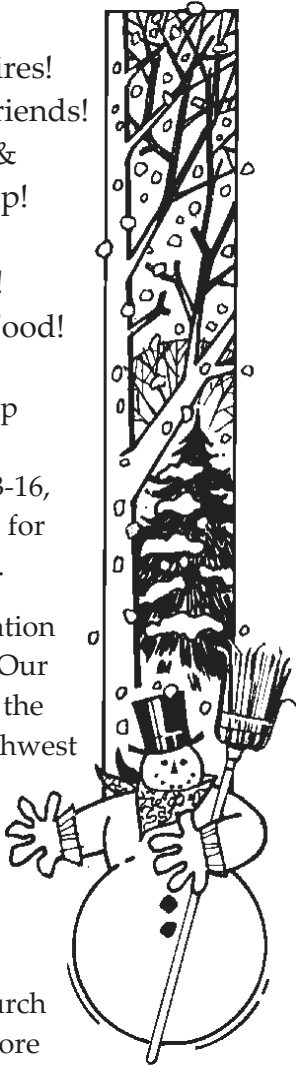
### Jr/Sr High Winter Camp at Mingus Mountain

## Small Group Advent Study: Finding Bethlehem in the Midst of Bedlam

When did Christmas get so chaotic? How about on the very night Jesus was born? We tend to picture softly lowing cows and a warm, cozy stable when we sing Christmas carols, but it couldn't have been very lyrical. Soldiers marched in the street. People were pushing and shoving. You couldn't find an empty room and food may have been scarce as well. In short, Bethlehem was the picture of bedlam. But in the midst of confusion and turmoil, God broke through and Jesus was born.

This five-chapter, DVD-based Advent study explores how God can still be heard over our human noise. Each chapter includes questions for reflection and discussion, a brief prayer, a focus for the week, and six daily Bible readings for personal devotional time.

Glendale Glitters' lights are on every evening, even though programmed events are only happening on Friday and Saturday evenings through Dec. 19. The non-event nights, Sundays through Thursdays 6-10 p.m., are a perfect time to enjoy a more serene experience and take in the 1.5 million lights, covering 16 blocks of Glendale's Historic Downtown!

Horse-drawn carriage rides are the perfect opportunity to spend time with loved ones, with a much-loved holiday tradition. The ride is a unique way to enjoy the light display. Carriage rides are available Sunday through Thursday evening, between Nov. 29 and Jan. 8, 6 to 9 p.m. (depending on weather and demand). The carriage ride line forms at 58th Avenue and Glenn Dr. Rides cost \$25 per carriage (up to 6 people) and take you through six blocks of historic downtown.

When gathering with the family, a meal is usually involved. Enjoy dinner and/or coffee and dessert at one of many restaurants and shops in the downtown area. Many critically-acclaimed restaurants include ethnic offerings like Italian, Polish, German and Vietnamese, and mom-and-pop establishments offer everything from authentic Mexican recipes to an old-fashioned ice cream parlor.
