Wanting to be a good friend and help him improve, I asked my friend why his paycheck was so low. I was shocked to learn that the other technicians on the team (including me!) were avoiding the oldest, most difficult repairs, leaving them all for him! He was actually more skilled

than all of us, but because he was doing all the most complicated repairs, he was making much less money!

He was also more concerned for his co-workers and had a strong heart for justice. In the end it was he who helped me. His humble sacrifice exposed my greed, and lack of concern for others. It was he who motivated me to improve my diagnostic skills as an electronics technician.

Celebrating Black History Month... Singing Secret Messages

There are a number of characteristics of the spiritual "O Mary, Don't You Weep" that some will find confusing. Why is Mary mourning? Perhaps it is a reference to Mary at the foot of the cross (John 19:25), witnessing the death of her son, Jesus. Perhaps it refers to Mary Magdalene weeping at the empty tomb (John 20:13, "Woman, why are you weeping? ... They have taken away my Lord ") or to her meeting and not recognizing the resurrected Jesus in the garden immediately following (John 20:15, "Woman, why are you weeping? ... Sir, if you have taken him away, tell me where you have laid him...").

But what does the weeping New Testament Mary have to do with the drowning of Pharaoh's army in the Red Sea 1,400 years earlier (Exodus 14:26-31)? The answer lies in the secret or coded messages found in many of the spirituals, including this one. As the slaves lived and labored under the oppression of their owners and masters, they suffered as did Israel under the Egyptians. It was acceptable to the oppressors for the slaves to sing about Mary weeping and mourning and about the drowning of Pharaoh's army. These were, after all, biblical events. They may have even been amused by what they perceived as obvious ignorance and confusion of the slaves who somehow connected the two seemingly unrelated events of crucifixion and drowning. But the slaves understood the connection: It was the escape of the persecuted from death and bondage -- Jesus from the tomb, Israel from Egypt. It was the promise of their own future freedom and liberation from the misery of slavery. They could sing this spiritual with its secret message unrecognized by their masters.

For more than 50 years, United Methodist congregations have been taking part in a special One Great Hour of Sharing offering, laying the foundation for UMCOR's ministry of relief and hope.

Donations UMCOR receives through this offering, along with other undesignated gifts made throughout the year, cover the costs of doing business. Gifts like yours make it possible for UMCOR to use 100% of all other contributions on the projects our donors specify, instead of on administrative or fundraising costs.

UMCOR does not receive United Methodist World Service or apportionment funds, so without your offerings, UMCOR would not exist.

Because they keep operating costs under 10% of the total budget, undesignated gifts may actually exceed UMCOR's administrative needs. When that happens, your support is channeled to under-funded programs, where they're most needed. They also may be used to allow UMCOR to respond to disasters immediately after an event and before funds can be raised.

NEIGHBOR Alliance

Have you heard of NEIGHBOR? It is an outreach mission begun in 2013 by the Church and Society Committee at our church. It is a network of churches, private organizations, and government agencies coming together to serve those in need. Our programs are interesting and inspirational, and have included such speakers as a mother who founded a veteran's support group after her son committed suicide; a person who helps resettle immigrants in Arizona; and a government representative who provides grants for people who are about to lose their homes.

Pretzels—The Prayer Bread

Years ago, there were Christians who were not allowed to eat certain foods during the Lenten season. Among these forbidden foods were meat, milk and eggs. Bread recipes ordinarily used milk and eggs, of course, so the bakers had to find some other way to make this important diet staple. The result was pretzels. Flour, salt, and water combined to make the dough which was rolled out and then shaped to resemble two arms in prayer (people used to cross their arms across their chest to pray). The German name for this bread was "brezel", which became "pretzel" in English. These snacks of our day are still a reminder of Lent as a season of deep and frequent prayer. Below is a recipe for soft pretzels:

1 c. warm water (105°-115°)

2 Tbsp. softened margarine

1 pkg. dry yeast

31/2-4 c. unsifted flour

1/4 c. sugar

1 egg yolk

1 tsp. salt

1 Tbsp. water

1/2 egg

coarse, or kosher salt

Dissolve yeast in the warm water. Add sugar, salt, egg, margarine, and 1½ cups of flour. Beat until smooth. Add enough additional flour to make the dough stiff. Cover bowl tightly with foil and refrigerate 2 hours or overnight.


Divide the chilled dough in half and place on floured board. Cut each half into eight equal pieces. Roll each piece into a braid about 18-20 inches long and shape each braid into a pretzel. Place on lightly greased baking sheet, and brush with egg yolk/water mixture. Sprinkle with coarse salt and let rise in warm place until doubled, about 20 minutes. Bake in 400° oven about 15 minutes until done. Remove to cooling rack.

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Ash Wednesday Reflections—The Acknowledgement of Sin.

eople of the Bible grappled with the concept of individual sin as well as that of corporate sin. Sometimes their prayers were for individual sin(s); and at other times, they all stood and confessed that their country had sinned. When their spiritual leaders stood and confessed the sins of their nation before God, we read nothing of individuals offering vigorous protests that they were not to blame. The people of Israel understood that they, as a group, took part in both the blessings that came to the nation for wise decisions and in the consequences that came from bad decisions made by their leaders. Rise or fall, they would experience life together as a nation.

This is a difficult concept for us to wrap our Western minds around. We have been conditioned by culture to think of ourselves as sole beneficiaries of the benefits or consequences of our actions. Newscasters, however,



remind us that, today, both the rich and the poor sit in anxiety together over matters too great for any one of us to remedy alone. We are seeing our country at its worst since the Great Depression. The economy is in such a state that any one of us could find ourselves homeless or jobless overnight. A more frightening thought, without intervention, any one of us could become suicidal or criminal in response. The present economic crisis reminds us that we are all in this together -- in spite of our individualism. If ever there were a time for us to consider corporate responsibility and corporate culpability, it is now.

The good news in this tome is that God has always been willing to forgive anytime a person or a nation repents. Think of the story of Jonah or of countless other Old Testament narratives where nations repented and turned their hearts to God anew. God forgave the people of Nineveh; God forgave Israel, countless times. This same God is willing to hear our prayers and to forgive us for any way that we as individuals have contributed to our country's present state. God is also willing to guide our corporate solutions as we look at the long uphill climb to restoration.

Every year, the Ash Wednesday texts call us to be alarmed about ourselves, to tremble, to tear our clothes, to pray. Each year, we walk in the footsteps of those who have gone before us in prayer and piety. And each year, many of us preachers find ourselves more exhausted than changed at the end of the 40 days! Would that this year would be different!

On behalf of the Trustees I would like to say hello and pray that you are enjoying the love and grace of the Lord.



The chiller system was shut down in December so maintenance could be performed on it and the boiler started for heating. So far we have identified a blower bearing needing replacement on the east cooling tower. As other items are identified, we will take action as needed. All the work needs to be completed before hot weather arrives. This is the system that cools the Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall.

If you are walking in the courtyard between the Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall, please take note of the new waste container. It is installed by the east half wall. Please make use of it.

A while ago the storage shed was broken into and some yard work equipment was stolen. At that time all the yard work equipment was moved to the Equipment Room (where the chillers are). This was done for security reasons. A new hasp and lock have been installed on the storage shed door. All the yard work equipment, including gas and oil, have been taken back to the storage shed.

The trustees meet the first Monday of each month at 6:00 pm in the Fellowship Hall. I encourage you to attend these meetings, and assist us in the maintenance of this beautiful campus.






