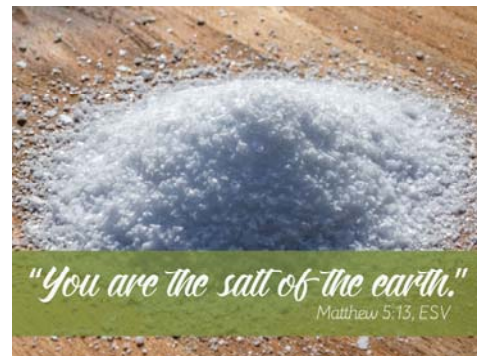
Salt of the Earth...

Salt is one of those items in our kitchen cupboard that I take for granted. I think because it is so easy to get—just a quick jaunt to the grocery store and there it is, in that large cylinder, enough to last a year or more! It's easy to find and lasts a long time. Unlike nutritional yeast (which I have sprinkled on popcorn since my college days), salt is something I always forget about until the day I open the cupboard and the blue cylinder is nowhere in sight—or worse yet, empty. Mind you, I most likely am the one guilty for emptying it and not putting it on the list. This never happens between the months of October and May, when my mother is with us.

The definition of “taking something (or someone) for granted,” according to Robert Charles Lee, a British guy who defines idioms

like this (and other American/English terms you may not be too interested in) has four possible meanings. First, “to consider something as true or real” without checking into it. Second, “to underestimate the value of [a] person or thing.” Third, “to not show you are grateful when someone helps you or [is] with you.” And fourth, “to expect something [will] always [be] available.” Mr. Lee suggests many Americans take for granted hot water. I'm certain Jesus could care little about any of this...but he is interested in our impact on the world. Ironically, salt was NOT taken for granted in ancient times, but was considered of high value to the Hebrews, Greeks, the Chinese, Hittites and other ancient peoples. (see <https://>



en.wikipedia.org/wiki/History_of_salt). This is most likely why Jesus chose salt as a metaphor when talking to the masses in the Sermon on the Mount. In Matthew 5:13, Jesus tells his followers and anyone listening that they are “the salt of the earth.” This is especially significant to those listening to him, for salt was an important commodity! Jesus was telling the people that they were valuable.

We sometimes forget how important we are when it comes to sharing the gospel and the good news

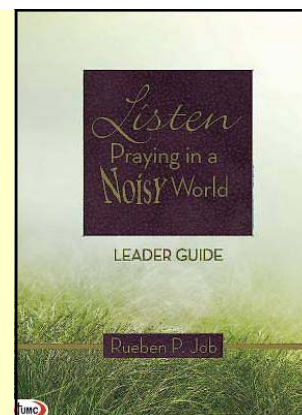

A New Church Council for 2017

On January 23, Church Council had its first meeting of the year. Church Council is our church leadership group and it has the responsibility for planning, implementing and evaluating the ministries in our church. Our United Methodist Book of Discipline gives the Church Council the following specific responsibilities:

- Plan and implement programs for nurture, outreach, and witness in the local church
- Provide for the administration of the church and its daily life
- Carry out the actions approved by the charge conference
- Meet at least quarterly
- Review the membership of the local church
- Fill interim vacancies among lay officers between charge conference meetings
- Recommend salary for pastor and staff, and pastor's housing to the charge conference after receiving recommendation from the pastor/parish relations committee (PPRC previously SPRC)
- Review the PPRC recommendation for the pastor's housing and report to the charge conference for approval

This year, our Church Council will be taking a look at our ministries from the viewpoint of being a house in our neighborhood. We are responsible for God's house and we have ministries that reach out to people passing by on our sidewalk, ministries for those who come to our "front porch" for brief visits, and other ministries to welcome people into our church family and encourage them to grow in their faith and become disciples of Christ. We also participate in ministries around the world through our apportioned giving.

30-Hour Famine **February 24-25, 2017**



What is 30 Hour Famine? Every year, hundreds of thousands of students in the US – and thousands more around the world – unite

through World Vision's 30-Hour Famine to feed hungry children and families. Our youth group will be fasting together for 30 hours February 24-25. In addition to asking for donations to help fight hunger, we will be participating in activities and challenges such as a poverty simulation, trek challenge, bible study, and community service.

- **Hunger Fact #1** – In 2014, 16,000 children younger than 5 died every day – most from preventable causes. It's estimated that nearly half of these deaths were tied to hunger. That's about one every 10 seconds. Most of these kids died not from starvation, but from malnutrition – meaning too long without the right kind of food. Eating just enough to stay alive weakened their bodies so much that disease could strike the final blow.
- **Hunger Fact #2** – Worldwide, 795 million people – about one in nine – are chronically hungry. That's nearly 2.5x the population of the United States. Many families depend entirely on what they can grow, so they're never more than one natural or manmade disaster away from hunger.
- **Hunger Fact #3** – Nearly one in 10 people live on less than \$1.90 per day.

There are three ways funds raised help: 1) emergency response; 2) recovery (helping in the wake of crisis); and 3) long-term development. Over more than sixty years, World Vision has learned that the best way to fight hunger is to give families the tools they need to put food on their own tables year-round. Their goal for children and families is food security. That means they can be confident about where their next meal is coming from – and that they get enough nutritious food to live an active, healthy life. Specifically, this means that the funds raised will help World Vision:

- Teach parents improved farming techniques
- Equip families to grow healthier, more abundant crops and livestock
- Provide access to clean water for nutritious harvests
- Run malnutrition centers when there's a food crisis
- Distribute emergency food supplies when there's a disaster
