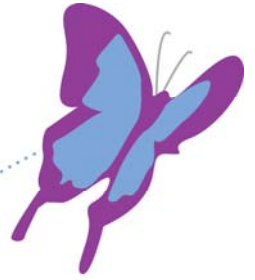

As we were reminded during our study of “Embracing the Uncertain,” Easter comes “after the first full moon that occurs on or following the spring equinox on March 21.”* That is quite a complex issue for the Worship Committee to start planning for the Easter Season. But we are ready for this sorrowful, yet exciting time.



Butterflies are “IN” again this year for decorating the sanctuary and patio areas during the Easter season. The Christian religion views the butterfly as a symbol of resurrection, change, and transformation. We will expand the use of the butterfly theme in the patio during the Sunrise Service on Easter morning. The youth have been asked to create butterfly backdrops for family photos and enhancement of the patio area during the early morning service.

The decorations are an enhancement to the word of God. Jesus used symbols, props, or decorations to deliver his word to the people. The Worship Committee uses music, decorations, audio-visual presentations and hand-outs to support and enhance the Sunday worship experience.

must also be guided by God. Remember Isaiah's words: *For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways.* (Isaiah 55:8, NIV)

In our church-wide study, "*Embracing the Uncertain*," we are encouraged to look for God in the midst of our unpredictable world. Human wisdom will lead us to avoid any person or situation we might judge to be trouble. But God's wisdom suggests something radically different. It's much easier (and safer) to avoid the uncertain things in life, but it can also lead us away from the very places and people God is bringing our way.

Jesus reminds us: *Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves...take up their cross daily and follow me. For whoever...loses their life for me will save it.* (Luke 9:23-24, NIV)

Paul reminds us: *The message of the cross is foolishness to those who are being destroyed. But it is the power of God for those of us who are being saved.* (I Corinthians 1:18, CEB)

No longer can we consider ourselves to be wise, and others to be foolish. For *now we see things imperfectly, like puzzling reflections in a mirror.* Not until (or unless) we temper our wisdom with God's plan, *will see everything with perfect clarity.* (I Corinthians 13:12, New Living Translation)

Only when we see ourselves as both wise and foolish will we come closer to the ways of God, who knows and loves us.

The installation of officers for 2018 took place in Fellowship Hall on February 1. This was a rainbow ceremony wherein Sharon Weber, West District Communications Coordinator, described the duties and responsibilities of each office. Judy Cleaveland, WD Spiritual Growth Coordinator, presented each officer with a tulip to symbolize that office. Each flower was in a different color of the rainbow. Officers also received a new red tote bag with words of John Wesley printed on both sides: "Do all the good you can...as long as ever you can."

Due to early deadlines, the last *Circuit Rider* did not mention that Jo Ann Kissler is the new mission coordinator for membership care. The Executive Board served a soup supper led by Becky and Karleen Miller.

The group immediately jumped into major events, with three occurring during the second weekend of February: Leadership Development Day (Feb. 10), UMW Sunday (Feb. 11), and the Glendale Chocolate Affaire (Feb. 9-11). A total of 15 members attended the LDD at Lakeview UMC, Sun City where Eva Ndavu was introduced as the new vice presi-

dent of West District. She joins five other Glendale UMC women who now hold WD offices: Judy Cleaveland, Helen Jackson, Pam Jackson, Christine Jones, and Linda Triolo. Our group received a Desert Southwest Conference certificate for faith, hope, and love in action for 2017. Glendale UMW also earned eleven (11) certificates for participants in the reading program (the best participation in the district).

February 11 was UMW Sunday with members participating in all three services. Christine Jones, Director of Outreach and Nurture, gave the sermon, "Following the Leader." Eva Ndavu and Pam Jackson were liturgists; Judy Cleaveland, Marilyn Hewitt and Ann Nimlos presented the good news for children and youth.

FUMC and UMW planned various activities to coincide with the City of Glendale Chocolate Affaire, an annual event held in and around Murphy Park. Genny Riner and daughter Marleah coordinated the open house in the sanctuary which included tours by Rev. Tom

Wick, a video, and personal talks as well as some generous gifts of chocolate. Christine Jones coordinated the UMW parking lot fundraiser which was a trial activity. The weekend proved a wonderful opportunity for city outreach.

Our Fellowship Hall will be a satellite location for the Rock-a-Thon on March 10 at Cross in the Desert Church in Phoenix. Women will be in their rocking chairs rocking to raise money for the Legacy Fund which has been established to support UMW future generations. Each member should be a Rocker or a sponsor. A rocking chair, near the new UMW bulletin board in the stage area of Fellowship Hall, is there for practice and rehearsal. Rocking is something we can all do! It does not require Olympic training.

UMW will be hosting the youth at the end of their 30-hour famine on February 24.

UMW Selection: "My First White Friend: Confessions on Race, Love and Forgiveness" by Patricia Raybon

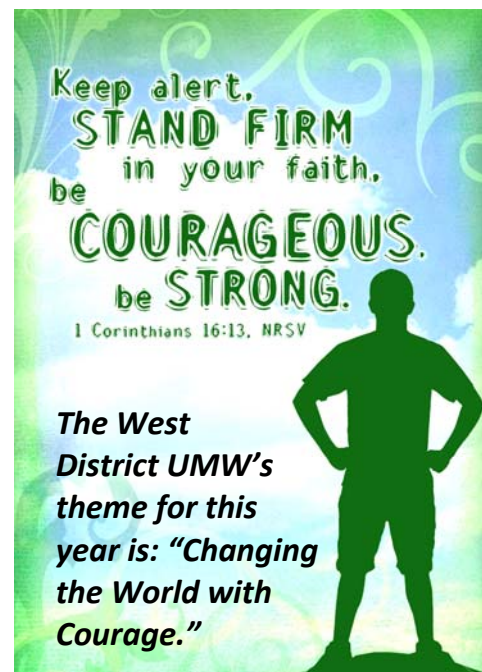
This book is one of our older UMW books, published in 1996 and the winner of a Christopher award. The author relates the problems she had throughout childhood with white people in her neighborhood and in school. As she grows older, she realizes that not all white people are bad, but she continues to have problems accepting them as part of her life. She marries a man of very light color, and has children both light and dark which adds to her dilemma about "white skin."

She often writes in a staccato style and uses quotes from Martin L. King Jr. and Gandhi. It is a powerful story of hard-won racial healing.

CBS Selection: "Light from Heaven," by Jan Karon

It's a time of Lent and lambing at Meadowgate farm where Father Tim and Cynthia are house sitting. Father Tim, a retired Episcopalian priest, is bored with doing very little so he asks for a church. He is assigned to Holy Trinity, a church high up in the hills that has been closed for forty years. He is overjoyed to find it has been kept intact by an ex-social worker/teacher and her deaf, mute son. He also finds that his parishioners are of highly varied character. Sammy, the runaway, delinquent, pool playing little brother of Dooly, their foster son, shows up to add some stress to their lives.

This is book 9 of the Mitford series; if you haven't read any others, you may want to start at the beginning!
