On May 20, we'll celebrate Pentecost, the miracle that changed the anxious disciples into courageous witnesses of the good news. After the crucifixion, the followers of Jesus were afraid talking about Jesus would get them killed. But after Pentecost, they couldn't stop telling others about Jesus. Before Pentecost, they felt disconnected from Jesus. After Pentecost, not even death could keep them apart. After his death, the disciples couldn't remember all the things Jesus had taught them. After Pentecost, they recalled all of his words and teaching. Before Pentecost, Jesus' followers were uncertain if Jesus had risen from the grave. After Pentecost, the truth of the resurrection would set them free!


There's much about Pentecost we cannot fully grasp or understand. For example, what were the "tongues of fire" like, and how is it possible that the disciples spoke in languages they did not know? It is all so mysterious, and beyond our wildest imaginations! But, then again, there are many things we choose to believe before we have them all figured out. We even take risks without a guarantee of a good outcome.

We do this when we risk loving someone, not knowing if the person will love us in return. We invest our money expecting it will multiply and not lose value. We put our confidence in new medications, with long lists

of complications--including death—to improve our health. We climb aboard airplanes, flying three or more miles above the surface of the earth, trusting we'll land safely at our destination. We trust the anesthesiologist to get us breathing on our own again after surgery, which has its own list of possible complications. We trust computer-navigated cars (or at least we did!), we've flown to the moon, frozen tissue for future use and spent weeks on a cruise in the middle of the ocean.

We may not fully grasp what happened at Pentecost, but if we decide to trust in the power of the Holy Spirit anyway, we, like those first disciples will discover

So, the little girl said, "I guess I can talk to you then." The teacher said, "Are you lost?" The little girl said, "No, am not lost; my Grandpa is lost!"

When the little girl was reunited with her grandfather, did he scold or chastise the child? No, he whispered in the little girl's ear and said, "I love you." The man stated that even if his granddaughter would not have been found, he would still have his faith in God. He reminded us that God rejoices when one of his children accept Jesus and have eternal life.

Knowing that God loves us even more than we love our children gives us the desire to live a God-shaped life. Let us remember to read our Bibles, pray every day and we will spiritually grow.



The Brad Riner Assistance Office Partners with Care Portal

We are now able to see and respond to requests for help from families involved with the Department of Child Services through **Care Portal, a platform of the Global Orphan Project**. The Riner Assistance Office officially began a partnership with this organization in February 2018. The partnership can be best described through words from Care Portal's website, "*CarePortal brings the needs of hurting children and families in your community to your attention. Child welfare workers uncover the needs. CarePortal makes local churches aware, giving them a real-time opportunity to respond.*" <https://careportal.org/>

As a partner church, we are alerted via e-mail to the needs of families in our neighborhood who are involved in the child welfare system in some way. If the need is something we can help with through the Riner Assistance Office or through small groups in our church, we are able to respond and let a social worker know to pass along our contact information to the family directly. Sometimes they provide us with contact information. We are able to give utility assistance to some families in this way as well as food bags, diapers/training pants, formula, baby food, baby wipes, waterproof mattress pads, or children's clothing. If you or someone you know has any of those items, please leave them in the collection box in the foyer or on the table in the library in the church office. If you have beds, dressers or car seats/baby furniture, call Dawn Horney at 480-500-1197. Those items are frequently requested.

Recently we had a working single mother come on her lunch break to apply for utility assistance, pick up training pants (thank you, LeGendre family) and she was able to use our only unclaimed Christmas gifts (pajamas and a Nerf® toy) for her son. She was tearfully thankful and said "God Bless You All!"

Two to three times a week, volunteers provide a friendly 10-15 minute phone call with an isolated homebound elder that often blossoms into a meaningful friendship.

A daughter, Linda, recently described the benefit that friendly phoning provided to her mother who was matched for 5 years with the same volunteer (until her mother passed away). They grew to be fast friends and her mother so greatly enjoyed having her OWN friend to share whatever was on her mind. The impact on her mother's life was huge.



BOOK REVIEWS

UMW Selection: "Please Look After Mom" by Kyung Sook Shin

An elderly woman with dementia is separated from her husband in a Seoul subway station. The relationship between her, her husband and children make for a thought-provoking, poignant story which applies to all cultures. This is one of our older books but one you won't be able to lay aside.

CBS Selection: "Education of a Wandering Man" by Louis L'Amour

Leaving home at the age of 17, the famous western novelist and short story writer led an

interesting life. He rode the rails, served on cargo ships around the world, was a lumberjack, a boxer, a mine guard and did most anything he could do find shelter and food! He always had books with him and read everything - famous philosophers, historical novels and yes, cheap westerns, anything he could lay his hands on! He did extensive research, through books and physically "walking the land" for his stories and had a library of at least 10,000 books. This is an interesting book, full of profound thoughts.



PENTECOST MOBILE

Make this craft as a reminder that God's Holy Spirit is all around you.

What you need:

- Tissue paper (red, yellow, orange), torn into squares
- Plastic transparency
- Craft glue
- Paintbrush
- Construction paper
- Black marker
- Wire hanger
- White copy paper
- Scissors
- Pencil
- Hole punch
- Fishing line



What you do:

1. Overlap tissue squares as "flames" on the transparency.
2. "Paint" glue (thinned with water) over the squares.
3. Fold construction paper in half. Write out Acts 2:4 at the top, by the fold.
4. Poke the hanger through the middle of the fold.
5. On the white paper, write "Holy Spirit" in English, Spanish (*Espiritu Santo*), French (*L'esprit Saint*), etc.
6. Cut out a flame pattern and trace it on the back of the transparency.
7. Cut out flames and glue the "Holy Spirit" names on them.
8. Thread fishing line through a hole atop each flame and tie flames onto the hanger.
