Update from the Finance Committee

In April, members and friends of First Glendale generously donated \$38,304 to support the operation and programs of our church. This total includes money received for the Easter offering, the General Fund, the Riner Assistance Office, Capital Improvements, Brick-by-Brick, Youth Fund, Camp Scholarship Fund, and other designated funds. This number is an improvement over last month's number, and more of the money was directed towards the general fund. On the expense-side, our expenses were again running lower than we estimated, and April was an income positive month. Our balance improved enough that we were able to make our April apportionment payment (after missing February and March). Furthermore, our month-ending balance allowed us to make our May apportionment payment as well. We have made three payments so far this year.

As promised, this article will share information about apportionments and why they are so important to the United Methodist Church. First, what are apportionments? The Desert Southwest Conference sets an annual budget. The annual budget is then divided or apportioned between the 118 churches which make up the conference. So our apportionment is the part which First Glendale owes. This year our annual conference support is \$56,069 (about 1/7 of our annual budget). This amount is determined by three things: (1) The total conference budget; (2) Our average membership; and (3) Our annual expenses. The conference budget will be set and approved at the upcoming DSW Annual Conference in June. The other two factors reflect the size and vitality of our churches. In 2019, every member of any United Methodist Church in the DSW conference costs their church about \$122. And every dollar spent on expenses costs their churches about 10¢ in apportionments. We are the 8th largest church of the 33 churches in the West district, so correspondingly, we get a larger piece of the apportionment pie.

All who attended our church's celebration for our 90-year-old sanctuary heard our Bishop, Robert Hoshibata, say two things regarding apportionments: First, he thanked First Glendale for making 100% of our apportionment payments in 2018. This is an outstanding achievement—only a minority of the churches accomplish it. So, I want to repeat his thank you on behalf of the Financial Committee. Thank you for our donations and support which enabled First Glendale to reach this milestone in 2018. Now we need to dedicate ourselves to repeating it in 2019.




The second thing Bishop Bob told us was the true meaning of apportionments.

“Apportionment” means “A portion meant for others.” And that is exactly the case. Every dollar we send to the DSW conference is apportioned this way:



- 2¢ is for training and church revitalization
- 5¢ is for camping and outdoor ministries
- 8¢ for new faith communities
- 5¢ for UMOM, Wesley Community Center, and the Justa Center
- 4¢ for financially-challenged churches
- 1¢ for the School of Theology at Claremont
- 5¢ for campus ministries at universities and community colleges
- 15¢ for conference structure
- 12¢ for pension and health benefits

- 18¢ for the worldwide United Methodist Church
