What is Lent and why does it last forty days?

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent comes from the Anglo Saxon word lencten, meaning "lengthen" and refers to the

lengthening days of spring. The forty days represents the time Jesus spent in the wilderness, enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin his ministry.

Lent is a time of repentance, fasting and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of selfexamination and reflection. In the early church, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by new converts and then became a time of penance by all Christians. Today, Christians focus on relationship with God, growing as disciples and extending ourselves, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of ourselves for others.

Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday represents a "mini-Easter" and the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.

Throughout Lent, you are invited to participate in a small group study: <u>The Walk</u>, a recent work of Adam Hamilton. Hamilton's book focuses on five vital practices of Christian life: Worship and Prayer, Study, Service, Giving, and Sharing our Faith. This study will be led by Pastor Kim on Tuesday evenings from 6:00—7:30 pm in the Fellowship Hall Stage area, beginning March 3 and continuing until April 7. These themes will also be explored in a sermon series on Sundays.



ne of my favorite TV ads these days is a spot for A-Milk. I'm not promoting milk or suggesting more time in front of the TV, but the song and the images of this short commercial captured my heart. It shows people laughing around the table, hiking in the beautiful surroundings, a father and daughter sitting close and a couple shooting baskets, all the while we hear the soft strings of a guitar and a soothing voice singing: Life is better with you. Of course, the idea is to encourage us to check out the new a2-milk which we are told is easier on the stomach, especially for those who are lactose intolerant. The tagline in the ad is: "Love Milk Again." There are TV ads that prompt me to hit the mute button, but this one gets me thinking... What does make life better?

The season of Lent is a time of repentance... which might seem like a somber, even a negative season of our lives. 

Update from the Finance Subcommittee—2020 Budget Approved

In January, members and friends of First Glendale generously donated \$36,979 to support the operation and programs of our church. This total includes money received for the General Fund, the Riner Assistance Office, Capital Improvements, Brick-by-Brick, Memorial Fund, Missions Fund, Youth Fund, and other designated funds as well as interest and increases to our Ameritrade investment account. Focusing on the General Fund, we had income of \$23,686 and expenses of \$26,449. Our spending exceeded our income by about \$2,800. While we did make an apportionment payment in January, our ending balance at the end of the month was too low to make a second payment in February.

As I mentioned in last month's article, we faced some hard choices with the 2020 budget. As you might expect, the church board was loathe to make cuts that would significantly affect the worship and outreach of the church. The subcommittee was directed to make only a few somewhat minor cuts with the knowledge that the resulting budget would be out of balance. Here is the budget for 2020:

Several points about the budget:

- Despite a poor showing on pledges in 2019 (only 89% collected), we remain optimistic and have included pledges at 100% in our income estimate.
- Certain expenses such as pastor's salary and apportionments are set by the Desert Southwest Conference and we have no control over those numbers.
- The biggest increase is in Building & Grounds and principally the electric payments to APS. We expect to resolve the discrepancies in the solar panel output shortly and may see this number go down.
- Last year our actual expenses were only \$350,131 which is close to our expected income; however, that included only 7 of 12 apportionment payments. If we had paid all 12 monthly payments that would have added \$23,799 to our expenses (\$373,930). Expect apportionments to suffer a similar fate in 2020 unless our income increases significantly.

This is your church, and you have the right to know how we are doing financially at any time. So, if you have any questions, no matter how big or how small, regarding the budget or finances of the church, I strongly encourage you to ask. You will get your answer.

May God continue to guide and bless our church.

Notes on a Simplified Church Structure

As a smaller church, FUMC is moving towards a Single-Board governance plan, and some of our leaders recently attended a webinar hosted by Rev. Nancy Cushman, the West District Superintendent. Linda Triolo, the chairperson, took some notes which are paraphrased below:

<u>Linda's notes on Simplified Structure Webinar, hosted by Rev. Nancy</u> <u>Cushman, January 28, 2020</u>

The webinar was composed of video segments of Kay Kotan, author of <u>Mission Possible: A Simple Structure for Missional Effectiveness</u>, speaking to a large group about simplified structure. She talked about a church's true mission, making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world, and that the motivation for streamlining the governance model is to become a "lean, mean, disciple-making machine." She emphasized accountable, mission-driven leadership.

Ms. Kotan talked about structure driving the church vs. mission driving the church. With structure driving the church, money and the buildings are the focus, rather than the mission. Another idea is management style vs. governing style: in management style, the focus is on the details, but there may be no one looking at the big picture, steering the ship while others are laboring to keep it afloat. Keeping our eyes on our mission was emphasized. "If we aim at nothing in particular, that's what we'll hit."

She discussed an organizational chart. The owner is Jesus Christ. The first beneficiaries are people outside the church, who need to be won for Christ. The second beneficiaries are the people inside the church. The pastor should be the head of the nominating committee, and people should not nominate themselves. The nominating committee should develop leaders. There should be a small number of decision makers, freeing, enabling and equipping a larger number of members to be in ministry, disciple makers. The minister provides vision, direction, and teaching.

Benefits of the simplified structure:

- Marries responsibility, authority and accountability.
- Promotes church unity.
- Functions on a high level of trust.
- Decisions are made quickly.
