# Holidays in a Challenging Season

As I write this, I'm in my apartment, midway through what I hope will be just one week of selfquarantine. As some of you already know, I was potentially exposed to COVID-19, and since I learned that, I let other folks who were around me know, and have experienced first-hand the challenges of isolation, which many of us have already encountered. I'm feeling fine; I haven't had any symptoms, and I hope that when my test results come back, I'll be able to resume activities, as much as any of us can, in this season.

And this season is one of challenges that seem to go on and on. As most of us are aware, a second wave of COVID is surging all over our Nation, including here in Arizona. Over 3,200 new cases were reported in the state today, including approximately 2,000 in

Maricopa County. I share this not to cause alarm, but to illustrate the nature of what we're facing.

I suspect most of us are experiencing "COVID Fatigue." We're ready to be done with this, to throw away restrictions and procedures, and resume normal lives. Yet, if we want to protect our well-being, and the wellbeing of others, as our faith tradition calls us to do, we can't do that just yet. There is very real hope on the horizon; medical developments announced recently promise a huge reduction, if not an end, to the pandemic in the coming year. But for the time being, we have to keep practicing the well-known precautions. I urge all of our First UMC Family: please wear a mask in public; maintain a safe



distance of at least 6 feet from those not living with you; and wash hands with soap for 20 seconds regularly.

However, even during these challenging times, our Worship Team and I are committed to offering opportunities for worship and spiritual enrichment which we hope will bring the meaning and beauty of the season of Asdvent and Christmas to our congregation. We are planning for:

# **Live Streaming Worship Services**

Did you know we are working towards live streaming our Sunday Worship Services? The Audio Visual Team, with Rev. Tom Wick leading the way, has been working towards this goal for several years and we are closer than ever!

#### What does that mean?

If you are unable to make it to church during the normal worship time, you will be able to open YouTube and watch as the video is being recorded. Depending on our settings, you might even be able to interact with the video during the service! The video that you see on YouTube will be showing during the actual service.

#### What if you can't watch at that time?

That is okay. The video of the worship service will still be available after it has been recorded. So if something comes up, you can still be a part of the service. You can view all of the sermons on our current YouTube channel, First Glendale.

#### Why am I telling you this now?

First, it is important that you know that the service will be streamed live so that you can ensure your privacy is maintained. There will be certain areas of the sanctuary that will **NOT** be filmed so that those people who do not want to be filmed or cannot be filmed will not be at risk. Your Audio Visual team is working to ensure your protection!

Second, if you are watching a live stream of the sermon, keep in mind it is not a performance. Mistakes will happen and we hope that everyone will be compassionate and remember that it is a real worship service.

Third, you need to understand your rights. If you do not want to be on film but want to participate in something that would put you in front of the camera's view, such as lighting Advent candles or reading God's word, you can let the team know in advance and we will change the view. For example, in the case of the Advent Candles, we can zoom into the candles and not show the person.

Fourth, due to our policy with minors, we will be ensuring the Children's Moment is off-camera.

Finally, we are planning to begin live streaming as soon as the traditional 9:00 am in-person service returns. We are ready and just like you, we are waiting for that day.

- A Special Worship Service for Christmas Eve,



# **Update from the Finance Subcommittee**


In October, members and friends of First Glendale generously donated \$22,650 to support the operation and programs of our church. This total includes money received for the General Fund, the Riner Assistance Office, Capital Improvements, Brick-by-Brick, Memorial Fund, Missions Fund, Youth Fund, and other designated funds as well as interest and increases to our Ameritrade investment account.


Focusing on the General Fund, we had income of \$21,025 and expenses of \$27,710. Our spending exceeded our income by about \$6,700 for the month. The expenses includes an apportionment payment to support the worldwide Methodist church. So far, as of the end of October, we have made 9 of 10 monthly payments, and we appear to be in a very good position to make our last three apportionment payments in November and December.

It's December as you read this and despite all of challenges in 2020, we do not want to forget our wonderful and hard-working staff which keeps the church going. Please make a donation to our annual Christmas Gifts for our staff. Please note on your check or envelope that it is intended for the staff Christmas Gifts and make it payable to the church. Time is short this year, so please make a contribution today.

Reviewing my last Circuit Rider article back in March, I noted that we were still working to resolve our larger-than-expected electric bills from APS. Unfortunately, while the bills from APS were misleading concerning the amount of electricity our solar panels were generating, the totals were, in fact, correct. We know the sun is the highest and the solar panels working their hardest about 12:00 noon. Unfortunately, the hottest part of the day and greatest A/C usage occurs around 4:00 pm, long past the peak solar power production. The upshot is during the winter our solar panels can cover our lower electrical needs. But during the summer, especially during long, hot afternoons, our electrical needs far exceed our solar panel production.







This is your church, and you have the right to know how we are doing financially at any time. So, if you have any questions, no matter how big or how small, regarding the budget or finances of the church, I strongly encourage you to ask. You will get your answer.


