## A Birthday Celebration

It's hard to believe, but as the temperatures climb, it's unmistakable. The warmer months of summer are almost upon us. And here at First Glendale, and in virtually every other Christian congregation around the world, the month of May will bring the day of Pentecost, the occasion when we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit to Jesus' followers gathered in Jerusalem, shortly after His resurrection and ascension.

In our faith tradition, Pentecost is also an occasion that marks one of the most important milestones in history. Although there already was a growing group of Jesus' followers after His resurrection, Chapter 2 of Acts describes how the Holy Spirit came as "Tongues of Fire" to those of all nations in Jerusalem, enabling them to hear

and understand God's message to them in their own languages. Peter then exhorted

those gathered to be baptized in the name of Christ and receive the Holy Spirit, and approximately three thousand people did so that day, marking the birth of the Christian Church.

When we celebrate a birthday in our families or with friends, we want to have a joyous celebration, and we'll likely do so for one or more of these reasons:

 We want to remember and celebrate the occasion of their birth, and what a gift that day was to their immediate and extended families.

Peter said to them, "Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ so that your sins may be forgiven; and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added.

-Acts 2:38, 41

- We want to acknowledge accomplishments in their life, either in physical growth and/ or in learning new skills in younger years, or in personal or professional growth as an adult.
- We want to celebrate who they are, and how they bring joy and love to our lives, whatever age they may be.

And much of the time, whether we're celebrating in person or from a distance, we share a card and/or a gift with those we honor, as an expression of what that person means to us.

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## Annual Conference 2021 Mission Project: Student Hunger

This year's Annual Conference Mission Project is centered around student hunger. Our campus ministries each day are meeting opportunities to help students with not only their spiritual needs, but there are needs regarding food security as well. We will be collecting \$25 Visa gift cards, or cash donations, which will be totaled and sent to conference for the benefit of our conference's campus ministries at ASU, NAU, U of A, and UNLV.



For some context, ASU has over 100,000 students in the metro Phoenix area, most of which are on the Tempe campus. Students who attend come from every "walk of life" imaginable. Some students come from families with means. Others come from poverty and are doing the best they can to receive an education to better their lives.

A recent statistic cited by ASU Wesley Campus Minister, Rev. Jamie Booth, found that 14% of students at 4-year institutions were facing housing instability. (Goldrick-Rab, Baker-Smith, Coca, Looker, & Williams, 2019) This may mean they're sleeping in the library and showering at the gym. It may mean sleeping in a car. It may mean sleeping in a different friend's dorm room every night. While Rev. Booth had not seen these content-specific statistics specific to ASU, she shared, "If we assume those statistics hold true... that would be around 14,000 students. Now multiply this times all four of our campus ministries, and you're looking at tens of thousands of students who are housing instable in our Conference."

Many more may have housing security but still lack regular access to food. Pre-COVID, the ASU Foodbank was helping about 400 students a semester across seven sites. However, earlier this year, one week saw 200 students signed up for nutrition assistance on the Tempe campus alone. This illustrates the increase in students needing assistance during these most difficult times of pandemic.

On May 16<sup>th</sup> we will be celebrating UMW Sunday, with Christine Jones preaching.

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## **Update from the Finance Subcommittee**

In March, members and friends of First Glendale generously donated \$31,746.44 (up over \$11,000 from our February donations of \$20,132.38) to support the operation and programs of our church. This total includes money received for the General Fund, the Riner Assistance Office, Capital Improvements, Wednesday Lunches, Brick-by-Brick, Youth Fund, and other designated funds as well as interest and increases to our Ameritrade investment account. Focusing on the General Fund, we had income of \$22,350.84 and expenses of \$20,473.65. Our income exceeded our expenses by about \$2,000 for the month. The balance in our checking account accordingly increased to \$9,884.80.

The donations to the restricted funds totaled \$9,395.60. A goodly portion of that is the interest we accrued from our bank certificates. We had two certificates mature and earned \$3,447.23 in interest combined. These monies, as well as the other restricted donations, are earmarked for specific purposes and cannot be used for the general day-to-day support of the church.

A few other bits of interest about March financials: Our pledgers are contributing 96% of the amount they pledge for the year-to-date. This is the best percentage in the last couple of years. Our pledgers, you are to be commended and thanked for your support. The end of March was Palm Sunday and we had over \$900 contributed toward our Easter offering. Easter occurred in April, so will be discussed in detail next month, but here is a preview: It was a very generous offering. On the negative side, our unpledged giving is hovering around 60% of what we budgeted. We hope that as we return to normal and people are attending church again, we will see that amount increase. Finally, we did not make our apportionment payment in March to the Desert Southwest Conference. That saved us about \$4,200, but we are failing to support the worldwide Methodist church and its ministries.

This is your church, and you have the right to know how we are doing financially at any time. So, if you have any questions, no matter how big or how small, regarding the budget or finances of the church, I strongly encourage you to ask. You will get your answer.

May God continue to guide and bless our church.

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## Real Talk about Live Streaming

Have you ever wondered what it takes to get the service from the sanctuary to your computers? Two years ago, the camera person would film the service and hand it off to the editor, who would fix up the video and add titles and slides and then it would be uploaded to YouTube.

Now, we are live streaming. This actually takes a little less work overall, but it is much more intense and a lot more people are involved.



- First, Rebecca creates the PowerPoint slides that you see if you are in the sanctuary.
- Second, Christine converts the Power Point slides to a picture so she can embed them in the videos.
- Next, Will sets up the camera to view the sanctuary or wherever we are filming and he hooks it up to the computer.
- Then, Jeremiah sets up the sound board so that the sound that you hear in the sanctuary can be heard in the computer as well.
- Then, Christine takes the camera view, the sound board sound, and the Power Point slides into a fancy computer program where it can all be seen at the same time. Next, she opens up the YouTube channel and sets the system to "Go Live."
- She then needs to check the system to make sure that the sound can be heard, the video can be seen, and that the slides will work properly.
- Finally, Christine monitors the "stream" to make sure that it is working and makes a "backup" recording of the video in case there is an internet failure.

That is a lot of people working together to make it possible to see the video "live" while it is happening. When it runs well, Will follows the action with the camera, Jeremiah adjusts sound as it is being filmed, and Christine hides and reveals the Power Point slides when they are needed. And that didn't even mention Ken, who is displaying the sanctuary view of the PowerPoint slides!

As you can imagine, if one person is sick or is unable to attend the service for some reason, the whole team has to find a way to cover, and that is hard! We really need backup, emergency backup, once a month volunteers, and anyone who is interested in learning any one of those stations or skills.
