We may be "Forgetting what lies behind," moving away from things that produced wonderful results in the past, but are no longer working today. And we may be "Straining forward to what lies ahead," moving beyond our experience and/or comfort zone to do things we've never done before. From experience, I can share that doing those kind of things, while they may be challenging at the time, often produce the greatest satisfaction. When we place our trust in God, and make fulfilling

God's purposes our priority, it's amazing how much God will grow our own abilities and understanding in the process.

In the midst of these generalities, there's one specific thing that many of us have already done, and I hope the rest of us will do, to help us move forward in a very concrete way. As I'm sure most of us already know, the Delta Variant of the COVID-19 virus, which is more contagious and dangerous than previous versions, is now the dominant strain in the pandemic. It's present in all 50 states, and is beginning to spread rapidly. Just a couple of weeks ago, I spoke to a relative of one of our members, who shared that her husband

had recently passed away from COVID, after a valiant struggle with overwhelming illness. My colleagues in ministry and I sincerely hope that we will not need to retrace our steps, and move backward to more restrictions, after all the progress we've made in the last few months. I'm asking, in the sincerest way I can, that those in our Church Family who are eligible and have not been vaccinated, to please take that step. If you or someone in your family has decided to remain unvaccinated, please prayerfully reconsider that decision and/or ask them to do so. If you have concerns about how the vaccines may impact your health, please discuss them with your primary care physician. And if you feel that vaccination is unnecessary, I ask that you consider getting immunized for the sake of family, friends, neighbors, and co-workers. As I shared several months ago, the only reason I'm advocating for this is to protect the people of our congregation from a potentially lethal disease. I, and I'm sure virtually all of us, want to be done with COVID once and for all, and move forward to the full lives we've wanted to resume for over a year.

With God's help, let's press on to what lies ahead. Let's do what we can to put our recent struggles behind us, and move forward to the exciting future that God has in store for us. And let's do all these things with our focus on the goal of a thriving First United Methodist Church, offering inspiring ministry to our community, in the ways that God will lead us to do.

The Brad Riner Assistance Office has received a \$2,000 grant from City of Glendale's From the Heart program. From the Heart gives agencies that provide services to Glendale residents a helping hand. Making a donation is easy; Glendale utility customers can add \$2 to their monthly bill payments. Thank you to the City of Glendale!

This has been a busy summer. The Riner Office is open on Mondays and Tuesdays from 11:00 am –2:00 pm. We serve 50-60 sack lunches daily, give out 40 homeless food bags weekly as well as family food boxes. And we still provide one-time emergency utility assistance of \$100 to those in need. This week alone we helped 17 people with utility payments!






What you need:

- Elastic string (12 inches)
- Colored beads (see below)
- Clear nail polish

What you do:

- Knot the string at one end. Add beads in this order: blue, white, gold, green, yellow, red, black, orange
- 2. Tie the ends so the bracelet fits your wrist. Place a dot of nail polish to secure the knot. Trim excess string.
- 3. As you pray, use the bead colors as reminders of Jesus' words (see Matthew 6:9-13):
 - **blue** = the Father
 - white = God's holiness
 - gold = God's kingdom
 - green = the earth
 - **yellow** = wheat (bread)
 - red = Christ's blood (forgiveness)
 - **black** = temptation
 - **orange** = God's power to deliver

Update from the Finance Subcommittee

In June, members and friends of First Glendale generously donated \$29,081.58 (up about \$2,400 from our May donations of \$26,618.01) to support the operation and programs of our church. This total includes money received for the General Fund, the Riner Assistance Office, Camp Scholarships, Capital Improvements, Wednesday Lunches, Brick-by-Brick, Missions and other designated funds as well as interest and increases to our TD Ameritrade investment account. Focusing on the General Fund, we had income of \$23,384.55 and expenses of \$18,905.70. Our income exceeded our expenses by about \$4,400 for the month. The balance in our checking account accordingly increased to \$15,417.53.

I'm happy to report that our pledgers stepped up in June and their giving returned to expected levels. Less happy to report that our non-pledged giving dropped in June by roughly a corresponding amount, so that the General Fund giving in both May and June was nearly the same. The increase in our checking account was due to the lower expenses in June (nearly a \$12,000 reduction).

Where did the savings come from? A variety of sources: Twice a year we have a month with an extra payroll (three instead of the normal two). This year that occurred in May. Our June payroll cost was \$4,500 lower. We did not make an apportionment payment in June; a \$4.700 savings. Also we lost our Youth Director at the end of May, resulting in a savings of \$2.200 in June. As reported last month we did not make a solar lease payment in June, but then we had some additional Building & Grounds (maintenance) expenses, so the savings in the category was only about \$1.000. However, all total, June saw some significant reductions in expenses.

The sanctuary chiller has been repaired and back in service. But we are deliberately running only one chiller at a time to keep our electricity rates as low as possible while the solar array gets sorted out. At this time we are producing no electricity from our solar array. The June electric bill from APS was over \$2,100 which we will pay in July. Going forward, it is going to be a long hot summer and our electric bills will grow accordingly. We will need our solar array back on line before we can run both chillers at the same time.



Summer Learning

On June 25th, I attended the Desert Southwest Conference United Methodist Women Mission u: Becoming Peacemakers in a Culture of Violence.

Did you know that Mission u is not just for women? In fact, this particular study was designed for youth, and was written for those interested in working alongside youth on issues of violence. Throughout the study, we had discussions on the definition of violence, the



root causes of violence, and how God is calling us to respond to violence. We had youth and men in attendance, which brought a lot to the conversation. We discussed visible violence, institutional violence, and cultural violence and discussed ally-ship and how to be an ally, all through the lens of biblical stories and examples. It was a great experience.

By the time you read this article, I will also have attended "*Pushout*" on the criminalization of black girls in schools and the racial justice movement to stop the school to prison pipeline. This will be a tough discussion and all of the participants will have to be brave to face their own issues and learn about what many of our young people are facing.


I will also have had the wonderful opportunity to lead the Adult VBS classes July 26-30. The study we are doing is based on the Serenity Prayer. I am really looking forward to leading the class, I know I will learn as much as I teach! If you missed it and really wanted to attend, let me know. There is one more Mission u study that I am really looking forward to: *Bearing Witness in the Kin-dom: Living into the Church's Moral Witness through Radical Discipleship* (August 13-14). This last study is about being empowered to imagine God's justice and to lead with compassion, to make a difference to all of creation. I am looking forward to learning more about being siblings in faith and bearing witness as we advocate for the future.
