For the last several months, there's something I've noticed about living here in the west valley. During the summer months, when rains falls in one place, it doesn't necessarily visit others. For many weeks, I heard members of our congregation talk about how they had had significant precipitation the day or night before, and I marveled at how there hadn't been anything, either at my apartment, or at the office. I began to think that I had discovered a new meteorological phenomenon – it was guaranteed not to rain wherever I was...

Then, several days ago, that finally changed. We had the "Gully-washer" of the summer! No matter where we were in the valley, or even in outlying areas, we had a huge dose of rain –

enough to give everything a good drink. As I returned to my apartment that night, it was refreshing to feel the rain, the cool air, to hear the thunder, and later, the sound of rain on the roof as I was falling asleep.

Over the next couple of days, I spoke to folks in our church family. I discovered that this time there had been no exceptions. Everyone had received a welcome downpour, and a couple of our dedicated volunteers had even anticipated the event, and spread fertilizer on some areas of our landscaping.

And that got me to thinking. Was the rain present only on locations that "Needed" or

"Deserved" it? Did it soak dry lawns, or places that had no irrigation, and bypass golf courses, and all areas that had sprinkler systems? Or, did the rain fall only on the homes of faithful United Methodists, and skip the properties of those from other denominations, or those who have no church home? The answer, of course, is absolutely not. The bountiful rain fell on all valley locations, soaking the ground, and giving all vegetation a sustaining drink.

That nurturing rain is very much like God's love. Whether we are aware of it or not, whether we feel we deserve it or not, God's love pours out on all of us. God's

New this year, all shuttle riders will receive a free taffy pulling kit courtesy of Cerreta Candy Company.

An important part of the event is the charity drive to benefit the Trauma Teddy Program. Bears & More, located at 7146 N 58th Drive, will be selling safety-approved teddy bears for \$10. The bears will be donated directly to the Glendale Fire Dept, Glendale Police Dept, local emergency rooms and the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office. These



organizations give the bears to children who are experiencing traumatic situations. The cuddly bears help comfort the child and assists the first responders in providing needed assistance and treatment to the child. More than 10,000 bears have been provided to the Trauma Teddy Program since the beginning of Teddy Bear Day.

Report from the Board of Trustees

Welcome back to Fall and what I hope will be a beautiful September.

As you may be aware, the trustees are responsible for the oversight and care of the church property, buildings, and equipment to further the mission of the church. In our meetings, we begin and end with prayer, express our concerns, joys, and observations to God and support each other in the process of caring for the mission and vision of the church. The Trustees generally meet on the first Monday of the month. We are considering moving that meeting time to coincide with Trustee Work Days with a final decision to be made in September.

For the month of August, we updated the church about the ongoing A/C repairs as well as the repairs that are in progress with the Solar Power system. We were notified of some issues with the church van, and have put a plan in place for the repairing of the van.

We discussed the gating around the church and additional gates that need to be put into place to ensure the safety of our office volunteers and of course Rebecca, the manager. We are


We are happy to train you in a job you are interested in and can create a schedule so that you only work **one Sunday a month**.

Six Month Report from the Finance Subcommittee

This month I thought I would do something different for my report. Even though it will be September before you read this, I am going to share the results for the first half of 2021, i.e., from January 1 through June 30. Each consecutive month in my previous reports you can see one month is up and another is down; likewise expenses are up and down as well. And I usually have some dire concerns about future expenses (e.g., the electric bill). This may be a case of being unable to see the forest because of all of the trees I point out. So this month, I will take a look at the bigger picture, at the whole forest. So let's get started.

The simplest place to start is with our beginning and ending bank balances. On January 1 our balance was \$21,906. Our balance on June 30 was \$15,418, a drop of \$6,488, or about \$1,000 a month. So the bottom line was we spent a bit more than we took in, but it was really a pretty good half a year. Income during those six months was \$132,373 which was 87.6% of what we budgeted. Our pledgers are running pretty close to 100%, so the short fall occurred mostly with the non-pledge giving. However, given the trials of getting in-person worship going again, I don't see this shortfall as unexpected.

Expenses were also less than the amount we budgeted. Our expenses totaled \$138,862 or about 84.9% of what we budgeted. While we can pat our backs for holding down expenses, the biggest shortfall was in apportionments where we made only half of our payments to the Desert Southwest Conference. That is not something to celebrate! Still, taking a small peek ahead, we have made apportionment payments in both July and August, including an extra payment in August. So at the time I'm writing this, we are down only two payments. I am confident by the end of the year, apportionments will be paid 100%.

Where we can celebrate is holding down our electric bill while our solar array is being repaired. The council agreed to run only one chiller (and cool either the sanctuary or the fellowship hall, but not both-except for the week of VBS) until the solar array is back on line—perhaps even by the time you are reading this. Once we can cool both, we hope to get the fellowship time in the fellowship hall up and running again.

As for the restricted funds, for the first six months we had income of \$22,817 and expenses of only \$18,837. The big hitters for the restricted funds are the Riner Fund and Capital Improvements.

Next month I will return to my usual monthly recap.

This is your church, and you have the right to know how we are doing financially at any time. So, if you have any questions, no matter how big or how small, regarding the budget or finances of the church, I strongly encourage you to ask. You will get your answer.

May God continue to guide and bless our church.
