Volunteers Needed for Wednesday Open Worship

Rev. Jelinek spoke this Sunday about the individual gifts and talents which enable each of us to be a special part of the Body of Christ. I encourage you to think about your special talents and how they can benefit your community and your church.

Our church has a heart for the homeless and on Monday and Tuesday the Riner Office provides sack lunches, and on Wednesday we provide a hot lunch for community members along with music and prayer, which we provide in the courtyard.

Currently we have volunteers to assist with this lunch, but we have only two people who "cook," i.e., actually take responsibility for the preparation of this meal for 50-60 people each week. If you have talents

that would lend to this outreach program, we would love to hear from you. If you would like to see what goes on at this lunch all are welcome to join us each Wednesday at noon. If you are interested in helping, think about the specific needs required for each lunch. The person in charge needs to be able to:

- Plan a complete meal for 50-60 people, keeping in mind the needs of the clients.
- Make a list of all needed ingredients needed for the meal. Look to see what ingredients are already in the kitchen and shop for the rest.
- 3. Prep as needed for the meal.

- Anticipate cooking and prep times, making sure all work can be complete and plated by 12:15 pm.
- 5. Supervise and delegate jobs to the volunteers.
- Follow food safety rules/ be able to get a food handlers card.
- 7. Leave the kitchen cleaner than you found it.

This may seem like a daunting list, but we are hoping to have a rotating schedule, so people only need to cook once per month.

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God in the Midst of Grief

The call came at around 12:30 am. I had spent most of the previous day at the care home where my father was living. He seemed uncomfortable when I arrived that morning, but had relaxed after receiving some medication, and was sleeping soundly when I left. The hospice nurses and attendants at the home had all said that dad had some time left, anywhere from several days to a week or more, so I went home to get some rest. But when the attendant called, it was with the news that dad had passed away a few minutes before. I called my stepmother, and was on my way back to the care home.

At first, I was numb, in shock. Then, a sense of relief followed, from knowing that my father, a person of great independence and self-reliance, was finally free from a body that could no longer function, and from the ongoing pain that was more and more present. Then, as I arrived at the home, saw my father's body, and began to work with the necessary processes that followed, a torrent of thoughts and emotions began. Conversations with family, friends, and many in our church family during the last week have helped immeasurably, and my family and I have felt the prayers

so many have lifted up in the last several months.

I'm also aware that many in our church family, and many in our extended families, have been on a similar journey in recent months. Many of us have lost family members or friends, resulting in feelings of deep grief, and a sense of loss, an empty place in our lives, formerly occupied by those we loved. I hope the following thoughts will be helpful, as we share this journey together.

As I'm sure many of us have experienced, no matter how much time we have to prepare, and no matter how much we have planned and rationalized how we will react when loss comes, it still takes us by surprise, and knocks us off our feet. The moment when we realize that we will not embrace, talk to, or share our love with someone we love again in this life is devastating. And for some time afterward, we may have times when we feel our deepest grief is over, then suddenly, a memory or an object will trigger another outpouring of sorrow. These



things are normal, and are a part of the natural process of grieving. We'll always miss those we loved, and wish they were here, but with time and God's healing mercy, the pain recedes, and we'll be able to share memories of those we've lost once again.

After hearing of dad's passing, I thought of all the things I had planned to share with him in the days that followed, and never did. I believe that those we love and have lost are safely in God's care, and that in the fullness of God's grace, they are aware of the things we may have wanted to tell them, or share with them. God knows, and, I believe, those we love know, that we did our

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2021 Financial Review

In December, members and friends of First Glendale generously donated \$76,826.63 (up a staggering \$43,000 from our November donations of \$33,373.97) to support the operation and programs of our church. This total includes money received for the General Fund, the Riner Assistance Office, Capital Improvements, Flower Fund, Wednesday Lunches, Brick-by-Brick, Centennial Fund, Missions, Staff Christmas Gifts and other designated funds as well as interest and increases to our TD Ameritrade investment account. Contributions to the restricted funds totaled \$29,856.91 (including a \$10,000 donation to the Brick-by-Brick fund). Focusing on the General Fund, we had income of \$46,762.60 and expenses of \$37,425.36. Our income exceeded our expenses by about \$9,300 for the month. The balance in our checking account accordingly increased to \$30,947.72.

There was a lot to cheer in our December numbers, and one of the most important was we paid 100% of apportionments to the Desert Southwest Conference. This was a \$47,000 expense for the year. Here is how the rest of 2021 turned out:

Looking ahead, we have some challenges in 2022. A part-time youth director, a functioning solar array, and starting the work to be funded by the Brick by Brick fund. Perhaps, we will even see the end of COVID and a real return to normal.

This is your church, and you have the right to know how we are doing financially at any time. So, if you have any questions, no matter how big or how small, regarding the budget or finances of the church, I strongly encourage you to ask. You will get your answer.

May God continue to guide and bless our church.
